EDITORIAL

Presenting ENHR Grand Paris 2025

It is with great pleasure and enthusiasm that we announce the forthcoming European Network for Housing Research (ENHR) conference: ENHR Grand Paris 2025, to be held in Grand Paris from 30 June to 4 July 2025. This conference is organised by the Lab'Urba research centre, Université Gustave Eiffel, and Université Paris-Est Créteil, with the support of a broad coalition of academic institutions and partners. This event promises to be a landmark gathering for approximately 550 young and established researchers, practitioners, and policymakers working in the field of housing studies across Europe and beyond.

The theme of the 2025 conference, Affordable Housing in Greening Cities, addresses the critical issue of just transitions. This topic reflects not only the major housing challenges of our time but also the urgent need to situate housing within wider environmental, social, and political transformations.

As the world faces unprecedented social and environmental shifts, the housing sector finds itself at the centre of multiple crises: affordability and accessibility are increasingly strained by economic inequalities, while ecological imperatives demand urgent action to decarbonise buildings and make urban spaces more resilient. In this context, the idea of a "just transition" - a concept initially developed in climate policy to ensure that no one is left behind in the ecological shift - is highly relevant to housing studies. But how can housing policies and practices become more socially and environmentally just?

The ENHR Grand Paris 2025 conference invites participants to explore this pivotal question from multiple angles. It will provide an opportunity to critically examine housing markets, policies, governance, and everyday experiences in light of pressing challenges such as climate adaptation, energy poverty, urban regeneration, and the right to housing. Furthermore, the conference explicitly calls for discussions on intersecting injustices - those shaped by race, gender, migration status, and class - recognising how these dimensions fundamentally influence individuals' experiences of housing transitions.

Grand Paris: A living laboratory for housing research

Paris is more than just a beautiful host city - it is also a living laboratory for housing research. The Grand Paris metropolitan area is home to nearly 10 million people. In recent years, this region has been at the forefront of ambitious urban transformation projects, including the Grand Paris Express, one of Europe's largest transportation infrastructure projects, alongside significant efforts to address urban densification, social housing provision, and the ecological renovation of its housing stock. Yet, like many European metropolitan regions, Grand Paris also confronts stark housing inequalities, rising real estate prices, gentrification processes, and contentious redevelopment programmes.

Choosing Grand Paris as the location for the 2025 conference reflects our intention to connect international academic debates with on-the-ground realities and lived experiences of housing struggles, policies, and innovations. Participants will also have the chance to engage with local stakeholders - including activists, public officials, architects, and housing professionals - through 17 field trips and special sessions integrated into the conference program.

A collaborative effort

The ENHR Grand Paris 2025 conference is organised through a collaborative effort involving researchers from a wide range of institutions across France. These include academic partners such as GIS ReHal (French Group of Housing Researchers) and research laboratories (e.g., LVMT, ACP, LATTS, Chaire Aménager le Grand Paris); key institutions (e.g., PUCA, the National Agency for Housing Renovation (ANAH), and Institut CDC pour la Recherche); and housing organisations (e.g., USH - French Federation of Social Housing Organizations), along with other leading research centres specialising in housing, urban studies, and planning (e.g., Fondation Gustave Eiffel, IDHEAL). This collective approach echoes the conference's commitment to fostering dialogue across disciplines, institutions, and national contexts.

As always, the ENHR Working Groups will play a central role in structuring the conference, providing dedicated spaces for researchers to present and discuss their work, build collaborations, and deepen thematic expertise. Whether on housing finance, migration, governance, homelessness, sustainability, or other emerging areas, the conference offers opportunities to engage with a vibrant and active research community. Furthermore, the event will include a dedicated day for over 120 early-career researchers, organised at Université Paris-Est Créteil on 30 June.

What to expect

The conference will feature keynote lectures by leading international scholars who will address major issues surrounding housing transitions and social and environmental justice. The plenary sessions will tackle questions such as:

- Balancing Social and Environmental Goals: How can we enhance housing energy
 efficiency without increasing socio-economic divides? How can we use land to produce
 affordable housing while preserving biodiversity and farmland, while also avoiding urban
 sprawl?
- Public Policy and New Economic Models: What innovative governance and financial strategies can sustain accessible housing amid rising environmental standards and shrinking welfare budgets? Is public housing still a driver for sustainability and access to housing?

The program will also include paper sessions and panels across the wide array of ENHR Working Groups; roundtables and special events bringing together academics, practitioners, and policymakers; 17 field trips guided by researchers or experts to key sites of housing innovation, struggle, and transformation in the Paris metropolitan area; networking opportunities for early-career researchers and experienced colleagues alike, including dedicated mentoring sessions; and, finally, social events to enjoy the cultural richness of Paris while forging lasting professional relationships. Looking forward together

ENHR Grand Paris 2025 will be more than just an academic event; it will be a crucial space to imagine the future of housing research in a rapidly changing world. In recent years, housing has indeed become a frontline issue in both social justice movements and environmental transitions. Scholars have a vital role to play in bringing critical perspectives, empirical knowledge, and innovative frameworks to guide these transformations. By coming together in Paris, we will be better equipped to face these challenges, foster solidarity between different research traditions and practices, and contribute meaningfully to fairer, more sustainable housing futures.

CC meeting decisions

During the meeting of the Coordination Committee on 28 March at Delft University of Technology, the following topics were discussed and decided that relate to the ENHR community.

ENHR participation in the International Festival for Social Housing 2027

ENHR has been invited to participate in the International Festival for Social Housing 2027 (4-6 June) in Portugal. Members of the Coordination Committee Montse Pareja Eastaway, Jaana Nevalainen and Iván Tosics will act as a petit comité that will put together a one-day programme. The working group Social Housing Institutions, Organisations and Governance will also be invited to participate.

Secretariat

The current office manager of the secretariat, Dirk Dubbeling, will remain on a freelance basis for a maximum of three years (2026-2028) after his retirement in January 2026. In the meantime, a successor will have to be found to gradually take over his activities.

Fee structure 2026

As of 2026, Bulgaria and Romania will move from country Group 2 (reduced membership fees) to Group 1, based on actual World Bank figures. This means that members from these countries are expected to pay higher fees. Asia will be part of group 2, with the exception of South Korea, Saudi Arabia, the Emirates and Oman, which will remain in group 1.

Community Manager

The Coordinating Committee has decided to launch a call for a Community Manager (one day per week) who will strengthen ENHR's communication, increase engagement and increase the visibility of housing research in Europe and beyond.

WG Coordinators' Meeting

As in 2019 (Athens), 2022 (Barcelona) and 2024 (Delft), the Coordinating Committee has planned a WG Coordinators' Meeting during the Paris conference. This time the Coordination Committee proposes an informal meeting with snacks and drinks, but also plans to discuss ideas for the upcoming years.

Manual Working Groups and Conference Guide

The Coordination Committee has updated the Manual Working Groups and Conference Guide and will present them at the General Assembly.

New Community manager



Anita Blessing is ENHR's new Community Manager. She'll be working to support and strengthen communication, collaborations and engagement both within and beyond the network. Anita has worked in housing research, policy and practice. She focuses on international knowledge exchange in social and affordable housing provision, and she is a joint coordinator of the ENHR working group Social Housing: Institutions, Organisations and Governance, and a member of the European Urban Initiative Expert Pool.

New Housing Researchers symposium 2025 evaluation

The fourth edition of the New Housing Researchers online symposium on 12 and 13 March this year, was considered a successful event by participants, chairs and the Coordination Committee.

A total of 48 abstracts were sent in and also 25 non-presenters registered The Coordination Committee noted that on a whole the presentations were of a good quality. 18 chairs presided the sessions. Unfortunately, several presenters and chairs cancelled unannounced during the event which meant the organisers Emma Holmqvist and Igor Costarelli (both New Housing Researchers Coordinators) had to fill in at short notice. Participants from Sweden, France, Belgium, Germany and Spain (12%), Italy, Hungary,

Survey results

Netherlands, Turkey (6%) were well presented.

44% was between 20-30 years old, most were second-year (47%) and first-year students (35%) with a background in Architecture, Geography and Sociology. Most participants were attended to the symposium by colleagues, supervisors and via newsletter. Almost all were first-time participants (78% in 2024) and all would participate again in similar events and recommend this seminar.

Most participants were 'satisfied' or 'very satisfied' about the information they received, the organisation of the event and the provided guidance during the sessions. Half of the respondents were fine with the time available for presentation and discussion, 33% would have liked more time for discussion and 17% would have liked more presentation time. The usefulness of the feedback (2/3 good/very good) was considered better than last year.

ENHR will try to improve the event further based on these figures and additional suggestions.

During the introduction and final remarks the participants were invited to register for the Grand Paris conference and present their work there. Hopefully many were stimulated to do this.

A call for the next online symposium (March 2026) will be produced at the end of 2025.

Proposals welcome for ENHR Conferences 2027 and 2028

The ENHR Coordination Committee (CC) invites research institutes and research centres which would be interested in organising an ENHR conference in Europe in 2027 and 2028.

A formal proposal for the 2027 conference should be submitted to the ENHR Secretariat (enhr@tudelft.nl) based on the ENHR-application form.

A formal proposal for the 2028 conference should be submitted by March 1st, 2026 to the ENHR Secretariat (enhr@tudelft.nl) based on the ENHR-application form.

An application form and guidelines for ENHR conferences are available on the ENHR conference page. These guidelines include a description of how such conferences are generally organised and what an application to host an ENHR conference should contain.

Application should contain information about:

- the date of the conference
- the profile of the organising institute and its reasons for hosting the conference
- a proposed conference theme
- a statement on academic quality
- former experiences in hosting conferences
- a budget which clarifies how to ensure the viability
- accessibility and affordability and hotel capacity of the location
- attractiveness of the location for housing researchers (what is there to be seen, esp. regarding to housing issues)
- the ability to attract an audience usually of 300-600 people. If a smaller conference is envisaged, a clear statement of the planned scale should be presented
- the availability of enough assistants (as students or junior researchers) during the conference
- the creation of a well organised conference webpage, which is maintained and updated on a regular basis
- the establishment of a Local Organising Committee (LOC).

The Coordination Committee would also need to be informed about hybrid conference options and carbon footprint reduction options of the conference.

Applications will be evaluated by the Coordination Committee based on these criteria. Affordability of the conference to the participants will be an important criterion.

Participants from all parts of Europe should be able to participate in the conference. Therefore, while setting the fees the organisers should take the affordability of the conference (travel costs, hotel accommodation and fees) into account. Ideally, some conferences should have lower fees and fees should preferably not exceed the fee of former conferences, as shown in the table below.

Research institutes and research centres that are interested in organising a conference are encouraged to contact the ENHR Secretariat (enhr@tudelft.nl).

Call for Proposals 2025

The Housing Agency's Research Support Programme aims to fund projects which respond to key topical issues in housing and have the potential to impact on housing policy and practice. Since 2020 the Housing Agency has supported twenty-four independent research. Previous successful projects are available on The Housing Agency website.

Research Focus - People, Impact, and Collaboration

The 2025 Research Support Programme will focus on three values and the themes are structured according to the three foci of this call. Proposals on these themes are invited. We are particularly interested in international research that is relevant to Ireland or could be applied to the Irish context.

Focus on People:

- Tenant engagement
- Community development
- People's engagement with housing at various life stages
- Inclusive housing and accommodation
- Suitability of housing to household need.

Impact and Evaluation:

- Examinations or evaluations of housing initiatives or programmes, paying particular attention to the short-, medium-, and long-term impacts of these initiatives
- Impact of research on policy and/or regulation
- How to measure impact of research.

Collaboration:

- International comparison pieces with relevance to the Irish context
- Case studies of international projects being studied and replicated
- Public-Private Partnerships.

Nature of support and timeline


We envisage that successful applications will be awarded a maximum of €30,000 over a 12-month period. Successful proposals will be awarded in late 2025 and research must be completed in 2026.






Summary of Social Housing Assessments 2024

The Summary of Social Housing Assessments 2024 brings together information provided by local authorities on households in their functional area that are qualified for social housing support but whose social housing need is not currently being met. It is a point-in-time assessment of the identified need for social housing support across the country.

This is a statutory assessment to count the total number of households qualified for social housing support across the country on 4 November 2024, in order to better inform policy and plan for the delivery of the right types of housing support. You can read the full report here.






Housing Insights Issue 5 and 6

About The Housing Agency





Unlocking Potential: A Comparative Analysis of Approved Housing Body Models in the EU

This new report, commissioned by Ireland's Housing Agency and prepared by Housing Europe, provides a timely and indepth comparative analysis of housing providers similar to Ireland's Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs) across four peer European countries: Belgium (Flanders), Denmark, Finland, and the Netherlands. Amidst Ireland's ongoing strategic review of the AHB sector, the report offers evidence-based insights to inform policy choices and strengthen the future role of AHBs in delivering social and affordable housing.

The study explores five key themes within each case study: governance, strategic role, asset and tenant management, delivery methods, and financing. Each national profile is based on contributions from leading experts and housing organisations within the respective countries.

The findings highlight a variety of structural models, including Denmark's off-government balance sheet approach and Finland's municipal housing companies, which combine public oversight with operational autonomy. The Netherlands offers a mature and financially self-sufficient model, while Flanders illustrates the benefits of recent consolidation and reform of social housing providers.

Together, these case studies present a spectrum of policy and institutional arrangements, offering alternative pathways for Ireland as it seeks to modernise and scale its AHB sector. Of particular interest is how these countries balance financial independence with strong public accountability, and how they mobilise private and public financing while maintaining affordability and equity. The report also examines innovative approaches to tenant engagement, energy efficiency, and counter-cyclical investment, underscoring the importance of flexibility and long-term planning in housing delivery.

LISER Research Seminar Developing an Anti-Displacement Tool for the City of Louisville

24 June 2025, 11:00 AM to 12:30 PM at the Luxembourg Institute of Socio-Economic Research LISER, Maison des Sciences Humaines 11, Porte des Sciences – Belval (Luxembourg)

In 2023, the City of Louisville, Kentucky, passed an Anti-Displacement Ordinance, a major victory for the Louisville Tenants Union which was championed by progressive city council member Jecorey Arthur. This talk shares the process of implementing the next step of the policy: developing an Anti-Displacement Tool, which had to be approved by the City Council prior to use (it was passed in late 2024).

The tool's aim is to mitigate the displacement that can occur from publicly subsidized housing projects. The tool will also serve as an online, open access resource for the public. The dashboard we developed for the tool innovates on two fronts: First, it combines data inputs about proposed residential projects together with multiple sources of data to create a measure of displacement risk in and around the area in which the proposed project is to be built. Through a statistical model the tool estimates the impact of the project on local rent levels and home values. Second, the tool uses these quantitative outputs (the measure of displacement risk) with a matrix that enables the City to say no to some proposed projects, or yes but with certain changes as a condition of funding.

Speaker is Loretta Lees, Professor & Faculty Director of the Initiative On Cities, University of Edinburgh, U.K., urban geographer and urbanist who is internationally known for her research on gentrification, urban regeneration, global urbanism, urban policy, urban public space, and urban social theory. She is currently Director of the Initiative on Cities at Boston University and a visiting professor at Singapore Management University's Urban Institute and in Geography & the Environment at LSE. Since 2024 she has co-organised the Boston Urban Salon; she previously co-organised 2009-2022 The Urban Salon: A London forum for architecture, cities and international urbanism and 2016-22 the Leicester Urban Observatory. She was Chair of the London Housing Panel 2020-22 working with the Mayor of London.

LSE London updates for ENHR Newsletter nr.2-2025

Inquiry into the role of intermediate housing in the borough

London School of Economics (LSE) has been collaborating with Hackney Borough Council (London) on an important Inquiry into the role of intermediate housing in the borough. The goal is to explore how this housing type can support people who live and work in Hackney to remain in the area amid growing affordability challenges.

Evaluation of Good Home Lincs

LSE London has also been commissioned by the <u>Centre for Ageing Better</u> to evaluate <u>Good Home Lincs</u>, a project led by the Lincolnshire Good Homes Alliance. Launched in 2024, Good Home Lincs aims to improve housing quality by offering tailored advice and support to residents. It combines an online tool for home assessments with dedicated caseworker assistance for homeowners. Running until autumn 2026, LSE London's evaluation will assess the project's impact, effectiveness, and cost-benefit—helping to understand how well this innovative approach supports residents in making essential home improvements. <u>Find out more on this blog.</u>

The two positions are part of the research project InCommon – Reconceptualizing Individual and Collective Housing Preferences. This project investigates the potential for housing models based on sharing and collectivity - such as cooperatives, cohousing, and ecovillages - to gain broader appeal and adoption across society.

The key questions guiding this project are:

- Is collaborative housing the preference of a niche group, or could it appeal to a wider public?
- What motivates people from different backgrounds to live collaboratively, and under what conditions?

By combining innovative mixed methods - including surveys, interviews, mapping, co-design workshops and the production of a documentary - InCommon will develop new ways to define and measure housing preferences, ultimately contributing to a deeper understanding of how housing systems can better reflect evolving societal values.

Together with a the team, you will organize two key project activities:

The Theory Building Lab: A forum for engaging with leading housing researchers across Europe in the discussion of InCommon's findings.

The User Engagement Lab: A platform for collaboration with stakeholders from the Dutch housing sector.

PhD defense at Chalmers University

At ENHR Institutional Member Chalmers University (Sweden) a PhD defense was celebrated: 'Sustainability in the home environment: supporting households in circularity and smart energy use through design' by Sofie Hagejärd.

Consumption related to households' everyday practices and lifestyles accounts for an important share of global resource use and emissions. This thesis aims to identify opportunities for more sustainable consumption within and for the home. This has been addressed by investigating households' thoughts and practices in relation to product and service solutions aimed at reducing environmental impacts.

The research concerns transitions towards future sustainable homes, with a main focus on circular economy and smart energy networks. Specifically, she is interested in exploring alternative design solutions and business models that can enable less resource intensive everyday lives of households, while also promoting their wellbeing. In the research project The Circular Kitchen, financed by EIT Climate-KIC, she investigates how to apply circular economy strategies in order to achieve a higher resource efficiency over the whole lifespan of the kitchen. In the research project FISMEP, funded by ERA-Net Smart Energy Systems, she focuses on the households' roles and needs in smart energy systems and what requirements this place on technology and services connected to the home.

Sofie's research at Chalmers University (Sweden) resulted in this doctoral thesis.

The main supervisor for Sofie Hagejärd's thesis was Paula Femenías, Professor (Division of Building Design, Department of Architecture and Civil Engineering, Chalmers), co-supervisor was Ida Nilstad Pettersen, Professor (Department of Design, NTNU, Norway).

Valentina Cortés Urra successfully defended her dissertation

Valentina and her promotor prof. Vincent Gruis.

In May, ENHR member Valentina Cortés Urra successfully defended her dissertation called 'Collaborative Housing in Chile: Policy, Precedents, Scenarios, and Long-term Implementation Strategies' at Delft University of Technology (The Netherlands). Her defence included a research seminar on decolonising housing and urban research, held on 22 May. Valentina's research explores the potential of collaborative housing as a possible housing alternative in addressing social aspects, including trust, solidarity, sense of belonging and community. She examines the precedents and current collective, self-organised initiatives in the Chilean context. Her dissertation proposes scenarios and strategies to support the implementation of collaborative housing models, offering guidance for government, private sector and grassroots stakeholders.

"I grew up with my family living in one big house," says Valentina, a native Chilean. "It made me curious about different ways of living." This fascination, combined with her passion for drawing, guided her towards studying architecture. But she didn't always fit in. "Most classmates wanted to design buildings that look impressive. I also wanted to create habitats for people to live in; designing for their needs!"


Valentina has already started a new position as a postdoctoral researcher at Eindhoven University of Technology, where she will investigate Housing First approaches and adequate housing models for reducing homelessness in the Netherlands.

Gerard van Bortel interviewed by municipal online newspaper



Some ENHR members also use their expertise as volunteers. For example, Gerard van Bortel supervises status holders in the municipality of Westland and made it into the municipal online newspaper.

The many volunteer jobs of Gerard van Bortel have a clear common thread: housing. "Making sure that people are in their place and are not crushed in the cogs of the system. You can do this at all kinds of levels", he says.

Locally, Gerard is involved with Dutch Council for Refugees as a Settlement Coach and Social Counselor in the municipality Westland. He is also chairman of the Core Group Housing, Welfare and Care (WWZ) within the Advisory Council Social Domain Westland (ASDW). At national level, he is on the board of the Woonbond and has a (paid) position as Member of the Supervisory Board of Housing Association Het Grootslag in Wervershoof, and Member of the Board of Commissioners of Housing Association Rochdale.

Gerard is currently committed to twelve families. His position covers two phases in the life of the status holder. Gerard: "If this person is assigned a home, I go along as a Branch Coach to the handover of the keys and the signing of the lease. I also help with, for example, applying for social assistance, arranging health insurance and finding a GP. After a few weeks, my role changes to that of Social Counselor, in which I act as a flying keeper in solving problems."


